Current DFAT Travel Advice

This advice is current for Mon, 5th November 2018.

Exercise normal safety precautions in Namibia. Use common sense. Look out for suspicious behaviour.

Screening measures remain in place for all passengers travelling from Ebola virus disease (EVD) affected countries. See <u>Health</u>.

Drive carefully. Tourists have been involved in single-vehicle accidents because of excessive speed and lack of familiarity with local conditions. See Local travel.

Tourist Visa Conditions

Australian ordinary passport holders do not usually require a visa to enter Namibia as a tourist for no longer than three months per calendar year. It is recommended that passports be valid for six months beyond intended stay. Travellers should also be able to show documentation confirming their ability to financially maintain themselves during their stay, as well as tickets and entry documents for their next destination.

Additional conditions may apply to minors. Travellers are recommended to contact a Namibian representative on the details below for further information and to ensure their specific circumstances make them eligible to enter Namibia without a visa.

Vaccinations and Health Precautions

The following information is intended as a guide only and in no way should it be used as a substitute for professional medical advice relative to a travellers individual needs and vaccination history. No guarantee is made as to its accuracy or thoroughness. For further information, please contact The Travel Doctor on 1300 658 844.

Vaccination against hepatitis A is recommended for travellers to Namibia. Frequent or long stay travellers should consider vaccination against hepatitis B. Vaccination against rabies (particularly if working with animals) and typhoid (particularly when travelling to areas with poor sanitation and hygiene) should be considered by travellers to Namibia. There is a risk of malaria in some parts of Namibia and dengue fever also occurs, thus insect avoidance measures and anti malarial medication may be necessary depending on your itinerary. Travellers are advised to drink bottled water and avoid ice cubes and raw/undercooked food. Do not swim in fresh water to avoid exposure to diseases such as schistosomiasis (bilharzia). Travellers coming from countries within the yellow fever endemic zone will require vaccination against the disease.

Regardless of destination, all travellers should be up-to-date with their routine "background" vaccinations including a recent annual influenza vaccination. Please consult a medical practitioner or contact The Travel Doctor for your specific risk to these preventable diseases and the appropriate avoidance measures.

Australians travelling to Namibia should ensure that they have adequate travel insurance to cover the length of their stay. Medications that are legal in Australia may be illegal in other countries. Time Differences between Namibia and Australia

Namibia is Greenwich Mean Time +1 hour (+2 during daylight saving). The applicable time zone is West Africa Time (WAT) or West Africa Summer Time (WAST). Daylight saving is observed from the first Sunday in April to the first Sunday in September.

General Destination Information Namibia

Duty Free Allowances for Namibia and Australia

Duty Free limits when entering Namibia:

Alcohol: 1 litre of spirits or liqueur and 2 litres of wine.

Tobacco: 400 cigarettes, 50 cigars and 250g of tobacco. Perfume: 50ml of perfume and 250ml of eau de toilette.

Total Goods: Up to the value of 50,000 Namibian dollars. Duty Free limits when entering Australia:

Alcohol: 2.25 litres of alcoholic beverages.

Tobacco: 25 cigarettes plus one open packet of cigarettes.

Other Goods: Up to \$900 (\$450 for minors).

Minors may not claim alcohol or tobacco products. Further restrictions apply when entering/exiting Namibia and Australia. Travellers are encouraged to familiarise themselves with these restrictions before crossing the borders of either country. converter required).





Banknotes and Coins of Namibia

The currency of Namibia is the Namibian Dollar which has the currency code "NAD" and is abbreviated using the symbol "\$" or "N\$". The Namibian Dollar is pegged to the South African Rand at the value of 1 to 1, thus the rand may be accepted as legal tender. The following banknotes are the most common in Namibia however other versions and denominations are in circulation. Pictures are not to scale. As it is illegal in many countries to print copies of bank notes, travellers are advised to remove the below images before travelling.

Significant Dates:

1800's - English and German missionaries explore Namibia.

- Germany claims the area as a colony. 1884

1904-05 - Local rebellions against German rule are crushed.

50% of the Herero and Nama tribes are wiped out.

1915 - South Africa takes over territory during World War 1. - Swapo begins an armed struggle against South 1966

African occupation.

- South West Africa renamed Namibia by the UN. 1968

1990 - Namibia becomes independent from South Africa.

- Expropriation of white-owned farms begins.
