### **Current DFAT Travel Advice**

This advice is current for Mon, 5th November 2018.

Exercise a high degree of caution because of the high level of serious crime. Pay close attention to your personal security at all times. There is a threat of terrorism in South Africa. Attacks could be indiscriminate, including in places visited by foreigners such as shopping centres. See <u>Safety and security</u>. The Western Cape, including Cape Town, is experiencing severe drought and strict water restrictions are in place. More information: <u>City of Cape Town</u>. The frequency of most types of crime is increasing. Robberies are frequently reported on the roads and at shopping centres. Visitors to shopping malls should remain vigilant at all times. Be cautious when using public transport. Avoid using minibus taxis due to safety and security concerns. Avoid large gatherings and demonstrations as they can quickly turn violent. See <u>Safety and Security</u>.

Parents and guardians must carry, and produce on request, a full (unabridged) birth certificate as well as a valid travel document (passport) for children under the age of 18. There are additional conditions for minors travelling with only one parent or unaccompanied. See <a href="Entry and exit">Entry and exit</a>. The rate of HIV/AIDS infection in South Africa is very high. Exercise precautions with activities exposing you to risk of infection. Victims of violent crime, including rape, should seek immediate medical assistance. See <a href="Health">Health</a>.

# Tourist Entry Requirements

Australian passport holders do not usually require a pre obtained visa to enter South Africa for a period of up to 90 days for tourism purposes. It is recommended that passports be valid for at least six months beyond the period of intended stay and have at lest two blank visa pages. Travellers should also be able to show documentation confirming they have sufficient funds to maintain themselves during their travels as well as tickets/entry documents for their next destination. Proof of immunization against yellow fever is required if travelling through an infected country.

Further documentation is required for all travellers under 18 years of age (contact a South African representative on the details below for a full list of additional documents required). Travellers are recommended to contact a South African mission on the details below for further information and to ensure their specific circumstances make them eligible to enter South Africa without a visa.

### Vaccinations and Health Precautions

The following information is intended as a guide only and in no way should it be used as a substitute for professional medical advice relative to a travellers individual needs and vaccination history. Vaccination against hepatitis A is recommended for travellers to South Africa. Frequent or long stay travellers should consider vaccination against hepatitis B and rabies (particularly if working with animals). Vaccination against typhoid (particularly when travelling to areas with poor sanitation and hygiene) should be considered by travellers to South Africa. Care with food and beverage selection is advised. There is a medium risk of malaria in South Africa and dengue fever also occurs, thus insect avoidance measures and anti malarial medication may be necessary depending on your itinerary. Proof of yellow fever vaccination will be required when entering South Africa if coming from a country with a risk of yellow fever.

Regardless of destination, all travellers should be up-to-date with their routine "background" vaccinations including a recent annual influenza vaccination. Please consult a medical practitioner or contact The Travel Doctor for your specific risk to these preventable diseases and the appropriate avoidance measures. Australians travelling to South Africa should ensure that they have adequate travel insurance to cover the length of their stay. Medications that are legal in Australia may be illegal in other countries. ## Duty Free Allowances for South Africa and Australia

Allowances when entering South Africa:

Alcohol: 1 L of spirits and other alcohol and 2 L of wine.
Tobacco: 200 cigarettes and 20 cigars and 250 g of tobacco.
Perfume: 50 ml of perfume and 250 ml of eau de toilette.

Other Goods: Up to 5,000 Rand.

Allowances when entering Australia:

Alcohol: 2.25 L.

Tobacco: 25 cigarettes plus one open packet of cigarettes. Other Goods: Up to a value of \$900 (\$450 if under 18 years).

Minors may not claim alcohol or tobacco products. Further restrictions apply when entering/exiting South Africa and Australia. Travellers are encouraged to familiarise themselves with these restrictions before crossing the borders of either country. ### **Electrical Adaptors and Voltage**

Electrical Socket: South African (type M) socket is the most common. The Europlug (type N) socket is now the standard for new buildings.

Supply: 230 V, 50 Hz (similar to Australia).

A voltage converter will generally not be required to use appliances designed for Australia. A socket converter is usually all that is needed for these appliances.





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## **Exchange Rate**

All rates were correct at a point in time on Monday, 05 Nov 2018. The "Interbank Rate" does not take into account any exchange fees, while the "With 4% Margin" adds 4% to the exchange rate to simulate a typical margin that would be paid when exchanging currencies. These rates have been rounded and should not be used when calculating transactions of large value.

## **Purchasing Power Parity**

The following is a purchasing-power comparison of the South African Rand and the Australian Dollar, using the Big Mac as a common good. While it does not present a faultless comparison, it is a useful indicator of the purchasing power of each currency.

Big Mac Australia: \$5.95 (AUD) = 61.04 South African Rand Big Mac South Africa: 30.00 (ZAR) = 2.92 Australian Dollars

A Big Mac in South Africa is therefore 51% less expensive than in Australia.

This comparison is based on 2018 prices using current exchange rates. Prices may not include variations by locality or local taxes.

Significant Dates:

Pre 400<sub>AD</sub>- Indigenous San peoples live in the area for millennia. 400-1600 - Bantu peoples from central Africa including the Zulu

and Xhosa begin to settle in southern Africa.

1652 - Dutch settlers found Cape Colony to supply shipping.
 1806 - Cape Colony is ceded to the British. Many Dutch

farmers (Boers) trek inland to found new republics.

1879 - The British prevail in the Anglo-Zulu War.

1899-1902 - Second Anglo-Boer War. Boer republics of Orange Free State and Transvaal become British colonies.

1910 - Colonies are joined to form the Union of South Africa.

1948 - Policy of apartheid (separateness) is introduced.

1964-90 - Nelson Mandela is sentenced to life imprisonment.

1990-94 - Apartheid is repealed. Mandela becomes president.



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
