Page 1 of 5 Important Information Prior to Travelling to Antigua and Barbuda

Passport and Tourist Visa Conditions

Australian ordinary passport holders do not usually require a visa to enter Antigua and Barbuda as a tourist for a period of up to 6 months. Passports are recommended to be valid for six months beyond the period of intended stay. Travellers should also be able to show documentation confirming their accommodation, their ability to financially maintain themselves during their stay, as well as tickets and entry documents for their next destination.

Travellers are recommended to contact a Antiguan and Barbudan mission on the details below for further information and to ensure their specific circumstances make them eligible to enter Antigua and Barbuda without a visa. Persons travelling via the US are also reminded of their obligation to comply with US entry and transit visa requirements.

Vaccinations and Health Precautions

Vaccination against hepatitis A is recommended for travellers to Antigua and Barbuda. Frequent or long stay travellers should consider vaccination against hepatitis B. Vaccination against typhoid (particularly when travelling to areas with poor sanitation and hygiene) should be considered by travellers to Antigua and Barbuda. As there is a risk of dengue fever and the zika virus in Antigua and Barbuda, insect avoidance measures may be necessary depending on your itinerary. Antigua and Barbuda is listed as a zika category 1 country. For information on the risks the zika virus poses to pregnancy, including up to 6 months following the exposure of either parent, see www.who.int/csr/disease/zika/en/.

Regardless of destination, all travellers should be up-to-date with their routine "background" vaccinations including a recent annual influenza vaccination. Please consult a medical practitioner or contact The Travel Doctor for your specific risk to these preventable diseases and the appropriate avoidance measures. Australians travelling to Antigua and Barbuda should ensure that they have adequate travel insurance to cover the length of their stay. Medications that are legal in Australia may be illegal in other countries. Time Differences between Antigua and Barbuda and Australia

Antigua and Barbuda is Greenwich Mean Time -4 hours. Daylight saving time is not observed. The applicable time zone is called Atlantic Standard Time (AST). The following times in Australia are a day ahead of the time in Antigua and Barbuda, for instance if it's Sunday afternoon in Antigua and Barbuda, it's Monday morning in Australia.

Antigua, 12 noon, June = Perth midnight; Adelaide, Darwin 1:30am; Brisbane, Hobart, Melbourne, Sydney 2am.
Antigua, 12 noon, December = Perth midnight; Darwin 1:30am; Brisbane 2am; Adelaide 2:30am; Hobart, Melbourne, Sydney 3am.

Page 3 of 5 General Destination Information for Antigua and Barbuda

Duty Free Allowances for Antigua and Barbuda and Australia

Duty Free limits when entering Antigua and Barbuda:

Alcohol: 1 litre of wine or spirits.
 Tobacco: 200 cigarettes or 50 cigars or 250g tobacco.
 Perfume: Up to 170ml.

Duty Free limits when entering Australia:

Alcohol: 2.25 litres of alcoholic beverages.
 Tobacco: 25 cigarettes plus one open packet of cigarettes.
 Other Goods: Up to \$900 (\$450 for minors).

Minors may not claim alcohol or tobacco products. Further restrictions apply when entering/exiting Antigua and Barbuda and Australia. Travellers are encouraged to familiarise themselves with these restrictions before crossing the borders of either country. 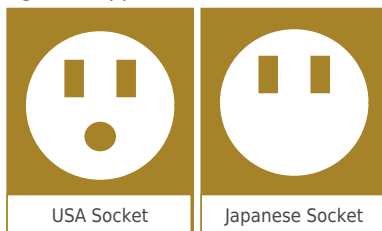
Electrical Adaptors

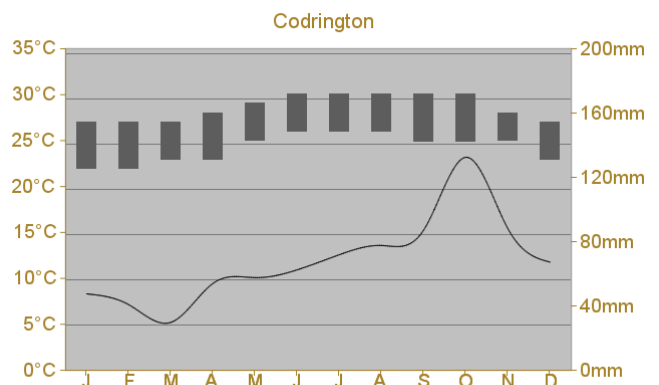
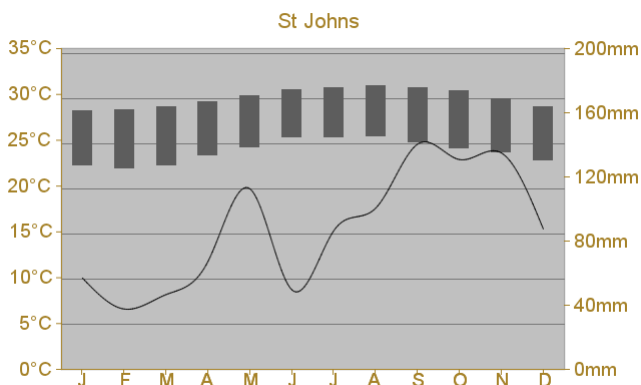

Interbank Rate

1 Australian Dollar (AUD) = 1.94 East Caribbean Dollars
 1 East Caribbean Dollar (XCD) = 0.51 Australian Dollars

With 4% Margin

1 Australian Dollar (AUD) buys 1.87 East Caribbean Dollars
 1 East Caribbean Dollar (XCD) will cost 0.54 Australian Dollars

All rates were correct at a point in time on Monday, 05 Nov 2018. The "Interbank Rate" does not take into account any exchange fees, while the "With 4% Margin" adds 4% to the exchange rate to simulate a typical margin that would be paid when exchanging currencies. These rates have been rounded and should not be used when calculating transactions of large value.

Banknotes and Coins of the East Caribbean Dollar

The currency of Antigua and Barbuda is the East Caribbean dollar which has the currency code "XCD" and is abbreviated using the symbol "\$" or "EC\$" to distinguish it from other dollar denominated currencies. The East Caribbean dollar is pegged to the US dollar at the value of US\$1 to EC\$2.70, thus many stores will accept US bills. The following banknotes are the most common in Antigua and Barbuda however other versions and denominations are in circulation. Pictures are not to scale. As it is illegal in many countries to print copies of bank notes, travellers are advised to remove the below images before travelling.

About Antigua & Barbuda

Independence: 1981 (from the UK).

Size: 443 sq km (20% the size of the ACT).
 Antigua 280 sq km; Barbuda 161 sq km.

Population: 90,156.
 Saint John's (capital) 27,000.

Ethnicity: black 91%, mixed 4.4%, white 1.7%, other 2.9%.

Language: English is the official language.

Religion: Protestant 76%, Catholic 10%, other Christian 5%, other 2%.

GDP Per Capita: US\$18,600 (Australia US\$40,800).

Significant Dates:

- Pre 1493 AD - The islands are inhabited by Amerindians, then by pastoral Arawaks and finally the Caribs.
- 1493 AD - Columbus visits Antigua and names it after a church in Seville, Spain.
- 1632 - Antigua is colonised by English settlers from St Kitts.
- 1674 - Christopher Codrington arrives introducing sugar cane.
- 1685 - African slaves are imported to grow tobacco and sugar cane.
- 1784 - Lord Nelson visits Antigua to organise defences.
- 1834 - Britain abolishes slavery.
- 1871-1956 - Antigua and Barbuda become part of the Leeward Islands Federation.
- 1967 - Self government is introduced.
- 1972 - The sugar industry collapses.
- 1981 - Antigua and Barbuda becomes an independent state.
- 1995 - Hurricane Luis hits the islands.
