Page 1 of 5 Important Information Prior to Travelling to Aruba Passport and Tourist Visa Conditions

Australian ordinary passport holders do not require a visa to enter Aruba as a tourist for a period of up to 30 days (specific period of entry is determined by immigration officials upon arrival). Passports must be valid for the duration of stay in Aruba, but are recommended to be valid for six months beyond. Travellers should also be able to show documentation confirming their ability to financially maintain themselves during their stay, medical insurance, accommodation arrangements as well as tickets and entry documents for their next destination.

Additional conditions apply to minors. Travellers are recommended to contact an Aruban or Dutch mission on the details below for further information and to ensure their specific circumstances make them eligible to enter Aruba without a visa. Persons travelling via the US are also reminded of their obligation to comply with US entry and transit visa requirements.

Vaccinations and Health Precautions

Vaccination against hepatitis A is recommended for travellers to Aruba. Frequent or long stay travellers should consider vaccination against hepatitis B. Vaccination against typhoid (particularly when travelling to areas with poor sanitation and hygiene) should be considered by travellers to Aruba. As there is a risk of dengue fever and the zika virus in Aruba, insect avoidance measures may be necessary depending on your itinerary. Aruba is listed as a zika category 1 country. For information on the risks the zika virus poses to pregnancy, including up to 6 months following the exposure of either parent, see www.who.int/csr/disease/zika/en/.

Regardless of destination, all travellers should be up-to-date with their routine "background" vaccinations including a recent annual influenza vaccination. Please consult a medical practitioner or contact The Travel Doctor for your specific risk to these preventable diseases and the appropriate avoidance measures.

Australians travelling to Aruba should ensure that they have adequate travel insurance to cover the length of their stay. Medications that are legal in Australia may be illegal in other countries. Time Differences between Aruba and Australia

Aruba is Greenwich Mean Time -4 hours. Daylight saving time is not observed. The applicable time zone is called Atlantic Standard Time (AST). The following times in Australia are a day ahead of the time in Aruba, for instance if it's Sunday afternoon in Aruba, it's Monday morning in Australia.

Aruba, 12 noon, June = Perth midnight; Adelaide, Darwin 1:30am; Brisbane, Hobart, Melbourne, Sydney 2am.
Aruba, 12 noon, December = Perth midnight; Darwin 1:30am; Brisbane 2am; Adelaide 2:30am; Hobart, Melbourne, Sydney 3am.

Duty Free Allowances for Aruba and Australia

Duty Free limits when entering Aruba:

Alcohol: Up to 1 litre of spirits.
Tobacco: 200 cigarettes or 25 cigars or 250g tobacco.
Other Goods: All personal effects and articles plus gifts up to a value of AWG400.

Duty Free limits when entering Australia:

Alcohol: 2.25 litres of alcoholic beverages.
Tobacco: 25 cigarettes plus one open packet of cigarettes.
Other Goods: Up to \$900 (\$450 for minors).

Further restrictions apply when entering/exiting Aruba and Australia. Travellers are encouraged to familiarise themselves with these restrictions before crossing the borders of either country. 
Electrical Adaptors

Modem Plug: USA.




Interbank Rate

1 Australian Dollar (AUD) = 1.29 Aruban Florins
 1 Aruban Florin (AWG) = 0.78 Australian Dollars

With 4% Margin

1 Australian Dollar (AUD) buys 1.24 Aruban Florins
 1 Aruban Florin (AWG) will cost 0.81 Australian Dollars

All rates were correct at a point in time on Monday, 05 Nov 2018. The "Interbank Rate" does not take into account any exchange fees, while the "With 4% Margin" adds 4% to the exchange rate to simulate a typical margin that would be paid when exchanging currencies. These rates have been rounded and should not be used when calculating transactions of large value.

Banknotes of Aruba

The currency of Aruba is the Aruban florin (sometimes known as the Aruban guilder) which has the currency code "AWG" and is abbreviated using the symbol "Afl." or "f". A florin is subdivided into 100 cents. The Aruban florin is pegged to the US dollar at the value of US\$1 to Afl.1.79, thus stores may accept small US bills. The following banknotes are the most common in Aruba however other versions and denominations are in circulation. Pictures are not to scale. As it is illegal in many countries to print copies of bank notes, travellers are advised to remove the below images before travelling.

About Aruba

Independence: 1986 (seceded from the Netherlands Antilles). Aruba is still one of the four countries which make up the Kingdom of the Netherlands.

Size: 180 sq km (7% the size of the ACT).

Population: 109,000 people. Oranjestad (Dutch for "Orange Town") 37,000.

Ethnicity: mixed European/Amerindian.

Language: Dutch and Papiamentu (a local creole) are the official languages, but most Arubans speak a minimum of four languages including English and Spanish.

Religion: Catholic 80%, other Christian 9%.

GDP Per Capita: US\$25,300 (Australia US\$40,800).

Significant Dates:

- Pre 1499AD - The Caquetio Indians of the Arawak tribe inhabit the island.
- 1499 - Explorer Alonso de Ojeda claims the island for Spain, naming it "the island of giants" after the tall native Arawaks.
- 1636 - The Dutch colonise Aruba to protect their salt supply from the mainland and establish a naval base in the Caribbean.
- 1805-16 - Britain takes control of Aruba during the Napoleonic Wars.
- 1816 - Aruba is returned to the Dutch.
- 1929 - Oil refinery established, raising the living standards of Arubans.
- 1954-86 - Aruba is part of the country of the Netherlands Antilles.
- 1990's - Tourism becomes the main industry following a slowing of the oil refinery business.
- 1986 - Aruba becomes an autonomous nation within the Kingdom of the Netherlands.
