### Page 1 of 5 Important Information Prior to Travelling to The Bahamas Passport and Tourist Visa Conditions Current DFAT Travel Advice

Australian Passport holders do not usually require a visa to enter the Bahamas as a tourist for a period of up to three months. Passports are recommended to be valid for six months beyond the intended date of departure from the Bahamas.

Travellers must have confirmed accommodation in The Bahamas and should be able to show documentation confirming their ability to financially maintain themselves during their stay, as well as tickets and entry documents for their next destination.

For further information, and to confirm that you are eligible to travel to The Bahamas without a visa, please contact a Bahamian representative on the details provided below. Persons travelling via the US are also reminded of their obligation to comply with US entry and transit requirements.

This advice is current for Mon, 5th November 2018.

*Exercise a high degree of caution in the Bahamas because of high levels of serious crime, mainly on the islands of New Providence and Grand Bahama. Pay close attention to your personal security at all times. See [Safety and security](#). Muggings, armed robberies, home invasions and sexual assault targeting tourists are common in the cities of Nassau (New Providence) and Freeport (in Grand Bahama). Cruise ship terminals and resort areas are often targeted, including in daylight hours. See [Safety and security](#). The hurricane season is June to November when landslides, mudslides and flooding may occur. If severe weather warnings are in effect, keep your passport on you, monitor media reports and follow the instructions of local authorities. See [Natural disasters](#).*

## Vaccinations and Health Precautions

Vaccination against Hepatitis A is recommended for travellers to The Bahamas. Frequent or long stay travellers should consider vaccination against Hepatitis B. Vaccination against Typhoid should be considered particularly if travelling to areas with poor sanitation and hygiene. As there is a risk of dengue fever and the Zika virus in the Bahamas, insect avoidance measures may be necessary depending on your itinerary. The Bahamas is listed as a Zika category 1 country. For information on the risks the Zika virus poses to pregnancy, including up to 6 months following the exposure of either parent, see [www.who.int/csr/disease/zika/en/](http://www.who.int/csr/disease/zika/en/).

Regardless of destination, all travellers should be up-to-date with their routine "background" vaccinations including for influenza. Please consult a medical practitioner or contact The Travel Doctor for your specific risk to these preventable diseases and the appropriate avoidance measures.

Australians travelling to The Bahamas should ensure that they have adequate travel insurance to cover the length of their stay. Medications that are legal in Australia may be illegal in other countries. 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### Time Differences between The Bahamas and Australia

The Bahamas is Greenwich Mean Time -5 hours (-4 during daylight saving). The applicable time zone is called Eastern Standard Time (EST) or Eastern Daylight Time (EDT). Daylight saving is observed from the second Sunday in March to the first Sunday in November. The following times in Australia are a day ahead of the time in The Bahamas, for instance if it's Sunday afternoon in The Bahamas, it's Monday morning in Australia.

Bahamas, 12 noon, June = Perth midnight; Adelaide, Darwin 1:30am; Brisbane, Hobart, Melbourne, Sydney 2am.

Bahamas, 12 noon, December = Perth 1am; Darwin 2:30am; Brisbane 3am; Adelaide 3:30am; Hobart, Melbourne, Sydney 4am.

Page 3 of 5 General Destination Information for The Bahamas

### Duty Free Allowances for The Bahamas and Australia

Duty Free limits when entering The Bahamas:

Alcohol: 1 quart (1.136 litres) of spirits and 1 quart of wine.  
 Tobacco: 200 cigarettes or 50 cigars or 450 g of tobacco.  
 Other Goods: Up to US\$100 in value.

Duty Free limits when entering Australia:

Alcohol: 2.25 L.  
 Tobacco: 25 cigarettes plus one open packet of cigarettes.  
 Other Goods: Up to a value of \$900 (\$450 if under 18 years).

Minors may not claim alcohol or tobacco products. Further restrictions apply when entering/exiting The Bahamas and Australia. Travellers are encouraged to familiarise themselves with these restrictions before crossing the borders of either country. 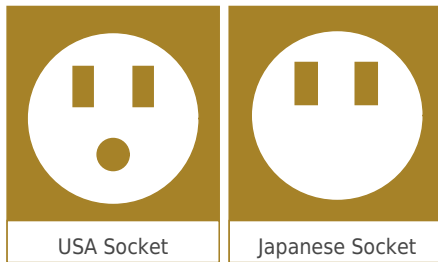
### Electrical and Telephone Adaptors

Modem Plug: USA.

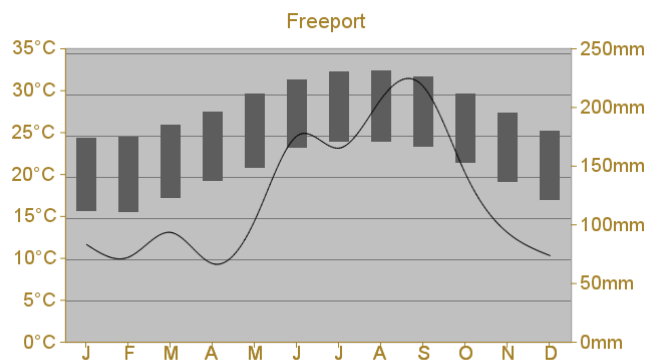
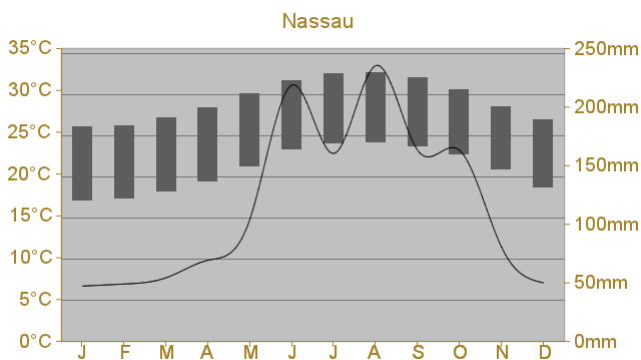

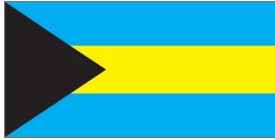

#### Interbank Rate

1 Australian Dollar (AUD) = 0.72 Bahamian Dollars  
 1 Bahamian Dollar (BSD) = 1.39 Australian Dollars

#### With 4% Margin

1 Australian Dollar (AUD) will buy 0.69 Bahamian Dollars  
 1 Bahamian Dollar (BSD) will cost 1.45 Australian Dollars

All rates were correct at a point in time on Monday, 05 Nov 2018. The "Interbank Rate" does not take into account any exchange fees, while the "With 4% Margin" adds 4% to the exchange rate to simulate a typical margin that would be paid when exchanging currencies. These rates have been rounded and should not be used when calculating transactions of large value.

### Banknotes of The Bahamas

The legal currency of The Bahamas is the Bahamian Dollar, which has the currency code "BSD" and is abbreviated using the standard dollar sign or as "B\$" to distinguish it from other dollar currencies. The Bahamian Dollar is pegged to the US Dollar at parity, meaning that both are accepted interchangeably throughout the islands. The following units of currency are the most common in The Bahamas however other versions and denominations are also in circulation. Pictures are not to scale. As it is illegal in many countries to print copies of bank notes, travellers are advised to remove the below images prior to travelling.

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## About The Bahamas

Full Name: Commonwealth of The Bahamas.

Independence: 10 July 1973 (from the UK).

Size: 10,010 sq km of land (14% the size of Tasmania).

Islands: 700 total islands and 2400 cays. Only 30 of the islands are inhabited.

Population: 320,000.  
 New Providence 70%, Grand Bahama 16%.

Ethnicity: African 85%, European 12%, Asian and Hispanic 3%.

Language: English is the official language.

Religion: Protestant 68%, Catholic 14%, other Christian 15%.

GDP Per Capita: US\$31,300 (Australia US\$40,800).

Significant Dates:

- Pre 1492 - Arawak Indian tribes inhabit the Bahamian islands.
- 1492 - Columbus visits San Salvador. Arawaks are decimated by disease and enslavement.
- 1666 - English settlers begin to colonise New Providence Island.
- 1715-25 - Height of pirate activity which flourished in the Bahamas.
- 1717 - The Bahamas become a British crown colony. Piracy is crushed.
- 1776 - 6,000 American loyalists and their slaves settle following the American War of Independence.
- 1834 - Slaves are emancipated.
- 1940-45 - Duke of Windsor -formerly King Edward VIII- serves as governor.
- 1964 - Bahamas is granted autonomy.
- 1967-92 - Lynden Pindling becomes Prime Minister, winning first elections.
- 1973 - Full independence gained.
