Vaccinations and Health Precautions

The following information is intended as a guide only and in no way should it be used as a substitute for professional medical advice relative to a travellers individual needs and vaccination history. No guarantee is made as to its accuracy or thoroughness. For further information, please contact The Travel Doctor on 1300 658 844.

Regardless of destination, all travellers should be up-to-date with their routine "background" vaccinations, including for Tetanus and Diphtheria (with a booster within the last 10 years), Whooping Cough, Polio (with a booster in adult life), Measles, Mumps and Rubella (two combination vaccinations through life), Chicken Pox and a recent annual Influenza vaccination.

Vaccination against Hepatitis B should be considered for travellers to Denmark if they are frequent travellers or intending on a long stay. Tick-borne encephalitis is present throughout many areas in Europe, predominately in forested regions. Whilst no vaccine is available in Australia, travellers visiting risk areas and planning outdoor activities during summer might consider vaccination once in Europe.

Please consult a medical practitioner or contact The Travel Doctor for your specific risk to these preventable diseases and the appropriate avoidance measures. Australians travelling to Denmark should ensure that they have adequate travel insurance to cover the length of their stay. Medications that are legal in Australia may be illegal in other countries. Prior to Travelling to Denmark Passport and Tourist Visa Conditions

Denmark forms part of the Schengen Area. Australian passport holders are usually allowed to enter the Schengen Area for Tourism or Business purposes for up to 90 days in any 180 day period without a visa. The countries which make up the Schengen Area are Austria, Belgium, Czech Republic, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Iceland, Italy, Latvia, Liechtenstein, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Malta, Netherlands, Norway, Poland, Portugal, Slovakia, Slovenia, Spain, Sweden and Switzerland.

Travellers to the Schengen Area should ensure their passport is valid for at least six months beyond their intended stay. Travellers are also recommended to be able to provide documentation confirming their ability to financially maintain themselves during their stay, travel insurance covering the period of stay in the Schengen Area as well as tickets and entry documents for their onward destination. Dual nationals may be liable for military service upon their return to Denmark.

Current Travel Advice from The Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade

This advice is current for Mon, 5th November 2018.

Exercise normal safety precautions. Use common sense and look out for suspicious behaviour. There is a threat of terrorist attack. There were two terrorist shooting incidents in Copenhagen in February 2015. Terrorists are likely to continue planning attacks. Be alert in public places such as shopping areas, places of worship, sporting venues, transport hubs, and places of mass gathering. See <u>Safety and security</u>.

There have been gang war related shootings in north-west Copenhagen. See <u>Safety and security</u>. Professional pickpocketing is on the rise, particularly in Copenhagen. Remain alert in crowds, tourist areas, public transport and near ATMs. See <u>Safety and security</u>. Temporary border controls are in place. ID checks apply at land and sea borders. Carry your passport when entering and exiting Denmark.

Time Differences between Denmark and Australia

Denmark is Greenwich Mean Time +1 hour (+2 during daylight saving). The applicable time zone is Central European Time (CET) or Central European Summer Time (CEST). Daylight saving is observed from the last Sunday in March to the last Sunday in October.

Denmark, 12 noon, Winter (Dec) = Perth 7pm; Darwin 8:30pm; Brisbane 9pm; Adelaide 9:30pm; Hobart, Melbourne, Sydney 10pm. Denmark, 12 noon, Summer (Jun) → Perth 6pm; Darwin, Adelaide 7:30pm; Brisbane, Hobart, Melbourne, Sydney 8pm.



Duty Free Allowances

Duty Free limits when entering Denmark from a non EU state:

Alcohol: 1 L spirits (>22% alc vol) or 2 L other beverages;

as well as 4 L of still wine and 16 L of beer. 200 cigarettes or 50 cigars or 250 g of tobacco.

Tobacco: 200 cigarettes or 50 cigars or 250 g of tobacco. Other Goods: Up to a value of DKK 3,250 for air and sea

travellers, DKK 2,250 for others.

Please go to <u>www.skat.dk</u> for further details on Danish Customs and Duty Free regulations.

Duty Free limits when entering Australia:

Alcohol: 2.25 litres.

Tobacco: 25 cigarettes plus one open packet of cigarettes.

Other Tax Free Goods: Up to \$900 (\$450 for minors).

For further details on Australian duty free allowances and other customs restrictions please go to www.homeaffairs.gov.au.

Minors (under 17 years in Denmark) may not claim alcohol or tobacco products. Further restrictions apply, travellers should familiarise themselves with these restrictions before entry.






Exchange Rate

Interbank Rate

- 1 Australian Dollar (AUD) = 4.71 Danish Krone
- 1 Danish Krone (DKK) = 0.2122 Australian Dollars

With 4% Margin

- 1 Australian Dollar (AUD) will buy 4.53 Danish Krone
- 1 Danish Krone (DKK) will cost 0.2207 Australian Dollars

All rates were correct at a point in time on Monday, 05 Nov 2018. The "Interbank Rate" does not take into account any exchange fees, while the "With 4% Margin" adds 4% to the exchange rate to simulate a typical margin paid when exchanging currencies. These rates have been rounded and should not be used when calculating transactions of large value.

Purchasing Power Parity

The following is a purchasing-power comparison of the Danish Krone and the Australian Dollar, using the Big Mac as a common good. While it does not present a faultless comparison, it is a useful indicator of the purchasing power of each currency.

Big Mac Australia: \$5.95 (AUD) = 28.04 Danish Krone
Big Mac Denmark: 30 (DKK) = 6.37 Australian Dollars

A Big Mac in Denmark is therefore 7% more expensive than in Australia.

This comparison is based on 2018 prices using current exchange rates. Prices may not include variations by locality or local taxes.

Notes and Coins

The legal currency of Denmark is the Danish Krone (or Crown in English), which is abbreviated using the symbol "kr" after the value, such as "20 kr". The subunit of the krone is the øre, of which there are 100 in every krone. The following units of currency are the most common however other units are also in circulation. Pictures are not to scale. As it is illegal in many countries to print copies of bank notes, travellers are advised not to take the below images with them when travelling.




