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Greek Country Guide

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Current DFAT Travel Advice

This advice is current for Mon, 5th November 2018.

Exercise normal safety precautions in Greece. Use common sense. Look out for suspicious behaviour. Forest fires often occur during June to September. See <u>Natural disasters</u>. A number of West Nile virus (WNV) cases have been reported throughout Greece. Protect yourself against mosquito bites. See <u>Health</u>. Avoid protests and demonstrations, as they may turn violent. See <u>Safety and security</u>

Be alert in tourist areas and on public transport (especially buses and trains to and from Athens Airport). Petty crime, such as pickpocketing, bag snatching and slashing of luggage, is a serious issue. See <u>Safety and security</u>. Drink spiking is a significant risk on major tourist islands such as Mykonos, Santorini and los. See <u>Safety and security</u>. To drive in Greece you need both an International Driving Permit and your current Australian licence. See <u>Local travel</u>. Check with your travel insurer to ensure activities such as car hire, quad bikes, motorcycles, jet skis or adventure sports are covered by your insurance policy. Ensure you hold the right licence for the vehicle you will use. See <u>Travel insurance</u>. A very high number of serious injuries and deaths occur every summer from quad bike accidents on the Greek islands. Avoid quad bikes. Always wear a helmet. See <u>Laws</u>

Prior to Travelling to Greece

Tourist Visa Conditions

Greece forms part of the Schengen Area. Australian passport holders are usually allowed to enter the Schengen Area for Tourism or Business purposes for up to 90 days in any 180 day period without a visa. The countries which make up the Schengen Area are Austria, Belgium, Czech Republic, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Iceland, Italy, Latvia, Liechtenstein, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Malta, Netherlands, Norway, Poland, Portugal, Slovakia, Slovenia, Spain, Sweden and Switzerland.

Travellers to the Schengen Area are recommended to ensure their passport is valid for at least six months beyond their intended stay. Travellers are also recommended to be able to provide documentation confirming their ability to financially maintain themselves during their stay, travel insurance covering the period of stay in the Schengen Area as well as tickets and entry documents for their onward destination. For further information and to confirm that you are able to travel to the Schengen Area without a visa, please contact a Greek mission on the details below.

Vaccinations and Health Precautions

The following information is intended as a guide only and in no way should it be used as a substitute for professional medical advice relative to a travellers individual needs and vaccination history. Vaccination against Hepatitis A is recommended for travellers to the Greece. Vaccination against Hepatitis B should be considered by frequent travellers or those intending on a long stay, whilst vaccination against typhoid fever should be considered particularly if travelling to areas with poor sanitation and personal hygiene. Tick-borne encephalitis is present throughout many areas in Europe, predominately in forested regions. Whilst no vaccine is available in Australia, travellers visiting risk areas and planning outdoor activities during summer might consider vaccination once in Europe.

Regardless of destination, all travellers should be up-to-date with their routine "background" vaccinations, including a recent annual Influenza vaccination. Please consult a medical practitioner for your specific risk to preventable diseases and appropriate avoidance measures. Australians travelling to the Greece should ensure that they have adequate travel insurance to cover the length of their stay. Medications that are legal in Australia may be illegal in other countries. 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Time Differences between Greece and Australia

Greece is Greenwich Mean Time +2 hours (+3 during daylight saving). The applicable time zone is Eastern European Time (EET) or Eastern European Summer Time (EEST). Daylight saving is observed from the last Sunday in March to the last Sunday in October.

Greece, 12 noon, Winter (Dec) = Perth 6pm, Darwin 7:30pm, Brisbane 8pm, Adelaide 8:30pm, Hobart, Melbourne, Sydney 9pm.

Greece, 12 noon, Summer (Jun) = Perth 5pm, Darwin, Adelaide 6:30pm, Brisbane, Hobart, Melbourne, Sydney 7pm.

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Duty Free Allowances

Duty Free limits when entering Greece from a non EU state:

Alcohol: 1 L spirits (>22% alc vol) or 2 L other beverages;

as well as 4 L of still wine and 16 L of beer.

Tobacco: 200 cigarettes or 50 cigars or 250 g of tobacco. Other Goods: Up to a value of €430 for air and sea travellers,

€300 for others and €150 for those under 15 years.

Duty Free limits when entering Australia:

Alcohol: 2.25 L.

Tobacco: 25 cigarettes plus one open packet of cigarettes.

Other Goods: Up to \$900 (\$450 for minors).

Minors may not claim alcohol or tobacco products. Further restrictions apply when entering/exiting Greece/Europe and Australia. Travellers are encouraged to familiarise themselves with these restrictions before crossing the borders of either country. 



The "Interbank Rate" does not take into account any exchange fees, while the "With 4% Margin" adds 4% to the exchange rate to simulate a typical margin that would be paid when exchanging currencies. These rates have been rounded and should not be used when calculating transactions of large value.

Purchasing-Power Parity

The following is a purchasing-power comparison of the Euro in Greece and the Australian Dollar, using the Big Mac as a common good. While it does not present a faultless comparison, it is a useful indicator of the purchasing-power of the currencies.

Big Mac Australia: \$5.95 (AUD) = 3.76 Euro

Big Mac Greece: €3.35 (EUR) = 5.31 Australian Dollars

A Big Mac in Greece is therefore 11% less expensive than in Australia.

This comparison is based on 2018 prices using current exchange rates. Prices may not include variations by locality or local taxes.

Notes and Coins

The legal currency of Greece is the Euro, which is abbreviated using the symbol € (for example €100). The subunit of the Euro is the cent, of which there are 100 in every Euro. The following units of currency are the most common in Greece but other versions and denominations are also in circulation (including a purple €500 note and other nations' coins). Pictures are not to scale.

145 BC - Romans invade and conquer the Greek Empire.

1453 AD - Ottoman Turks take control of Greece.

1821-32 - War of Independence against Ottoman Turkey. 1941-45 - Greece occupied by Germany in World War 2.

Over 100,000 die from famine.

1946-49 - Greek Civil War.

1967-73 - The Regime of the Colonels rules Greece.
