Page 1 of 5 Important Information Prior to Travelling to Romania

### Current DFAT Travel Advice

This advice is current for Mon, 5th November 2018.

*Exercise normal safety precautions in Romania. Use common sense and look out for suspicious behaviour, as you would in Australia. Drink spiking occurs, particularly in Centrul Vechi (the old town in Bucharest). Never leave food or drink unattended. Don't accept food, beverages, gum or cigarettes from strangers or new acquaintances. See [Safety and security](#). Terrorism is a threat throughout Europe. Terrorist attacks have occurred in a number of European cities. See [Safety and security](#).*

*Check with your travel insurer to ensure activities, such as car hire, quad bikes, motorcycles, jet skis or "adventure sports" are covered by your policy. Seek advice on any restrictions that may apply (such as if you are not licensed for those vehicles in Australia). See [Safety and security](#).*

### Tourist Visa Conditions

Australian Passport holders travelling to Romania for tourism purposes do not usually require a visa. Upon entering Romania travellers should be granted admission for 90 days within any six month period. Passports are recommended to be valid for six months beyond the intended duration of stay in Romania.

When entering Romania, travellers are also recommended to be able to provide documentation confirming their ability to financially maintain themselves during their stay as well as tickets and entry documents for their onward destination.

Additional conditions may apply to minors. Travellers are recommended to contact a Romanian mission on the details below for further information and to ensure their specific circumstances make them eligible to enter Romania without a visa.

### Vaccinations and Health Precautions

The following information is intended as a guide only and in no way should it be used as a substitute for professional medical advice relative to a travellers individual needs and vaccination history. Vaccination against Hepatitis A is recommended for travellers to Romania. Frequent or long stay travellers should consider vaccination against Hepatitis B, Rabies (particularly if working with animals) and Typhoid (particularly when travelling to areas with poor sanitation and hygiene). Tick-borne encephalitis is present throughout many areas in Europe, predominately in forested regions. Whilst no vaccine is available in Australia, travellers visiting risk areas and planning outdoor activities during summer might consider vaccination once in Europe. Regardless of destination, all travellers should be up-to-date with their routine "background" vaccinations, including a recent annual Influenza vaccination.

Please consult a medical practitioner or contact The Travel Doctor for your specific risk to these preventable diseases and the appropriate avoidance measures. Australians travelling to Romania should ensure that they have adequate travel insurance to cover the length of their stay. Medications that are legal in Australia may be illegal in other countries. ### Time Differences between Romania and Australia

Romania is Greenwich Mean Time +2 hours (+3 during daylight saving). The applicable time zone is Eastern European Time (EET) or Eastern European Summer Time (EEST). Daylight saving is observed from the last Sunday in March to the last Sunday in October.

Romania, 12 noon, Winter (Dec) = Perth 6pm; Darwin 7:30pm; Brisbane 8pm; Adelaide 8:30pm; Hobart, Melbourne, Sydney 9pm.  
Romania, 12 noon, Summer (Jun) = Perth 5pm; Darwin, Adelaide 6:30pm; Brisbane, Hobart, Melbourne, Sydney 7pm.

### Duty Free Allowances

Duty Free limits when entering Romania from a non EU state:

Alcohol: 1 L spirits (>22% alc vol) or 2 L other beverages; as well as 4 L of still wine and 16 L of beer.

Tobacco: 40 cigarettes or 10 cigars or 50 g of tobacco.

Other Goods: Up to a value of €430 for air and sea travellers, €300 for others and €150 for those under 15 years.

Duty Free limits when entering Australia:

Alcohol: 2.25 L.

Tobacco: 25 cigarettes plus one open packet of cigarettes.

Other Goods: Up to a value of \$900 (\$450 if under 18 years).

Minors may not claim alcohol or tobacco products. Further restrictions apply when entering Romania and Australia. Travellers are encouraged to familiarise themselves with these restrictions before entering either country. Special Tip: Romania also uses the Russian/Polish telephone adaptor system.



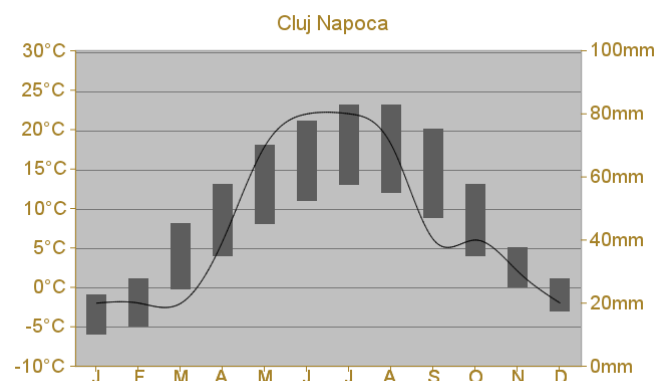
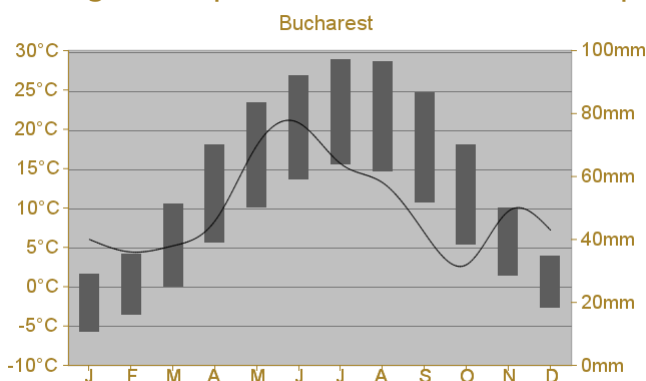

#### Interbank Rate

1 Australian Dollar (AUD) = 2.94 Romanian Lei  
 1 Romanian Leu (RON) = 0.34 Australian Dollars

#### With 4% Margin

1 Australian Dollar (AUD) will buy 2.82 Romanian Lei  
 1 Romanian Leu (RON) will cost 0.35 Australian Dollars

All rates were correct at a point in time on Monday, 05 Nov 2018. The "Interbank Rate" does not take into account any exchange fees, while the "With 4% Margin" adds 4% to the exchange rate to simulate a typical margin that would be paid when exchanging currencies. These rates have been rounded and should not be used when calculating transactions of large value.

### Banknotes of Romania

The legal currency of Romania is the Leu (plural Lei, meaning Lion), which has the currency code "RON". The subunit of the leu is called the ban (plural bani). The following units of currency are the most common in Romania however other versions and denominations are also in circulation. Pictures are not to scale. As it is illegal in many countries to print copies of bank notes, travellers are advised to remove the below images prior to travelling. Romania is aiming to join the euro area in approximately 2020.
