Page 1 of 5 Important Information Current DFAT Travel Advice

This advice is current for Mon, 5th November 2018.

Exercise normal safety precautions. Use common sense and look out for suspicious behaviour. There is a threat of terrorist attack in Spain. In August 2017, 16 people were killed and many injured in vehicle attacks in Barcelona and Cambrils. Terrorists are likely to continue planning attacks targeting Spain. Be alert in public places such as shopping areas, places of worship, sporting venues, public transport, other transport hubs, and places of mass gathering. See <u>Safety and security</u>.

Petty crime is common, particularly in tourist areas and on public transport in large Spanish cities. Foreigners are also targeted by scams. See <u>Safety and security</u>. Demonstrations and strikes affecting traffic and transport services can occur with little or no warning. Monitor local media, avoid demonstrations and be ready to adjust your travel plans as delays and cancellations are likely. Demonstrations can become violent. See <u>Safety and security</u>. Spain experiences forest fires, especially in the Summer months and in rural areas. In the event of a fire monitor local media and follow instructions of local authorities (see <u>Natural disasters</u>).

Prior to Travelling to Spain Tourist Entry Requirements

Spain forms part of the Schengen Area. Australian passport holders are usually allowed to enter the Schengen Area for tourism or business purposes for up to 90 days in any 180 day period without a visa. The countries which make up the Schengen Area are Austria, Belgium, Czech Republic, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Iceland, Italy, Latvia, Liechtenstein, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Malta, Netherlands, Norway, Poland, Portugal, Slovakia, Slovenia, Spain, Sweden and Switzerland.

Travellers to the Schengen Area are recommended to ensure their passport is valid for at least six months beyond their intended stay. Travellers are also recommended to be able to provide documentation confirming their accommodation arrangements, ability to financially maintain themselves and travel insurance covering their period of stay in the Schengen Area as well as tickets and entry documents for their onward destination. Additional conditions may apply to minors. Travellers are recommended to contact a Spanish mission on the details below for further information and to ensure their specific circumstances make them eligible to enter Spain without a visa.

Vaccinations and Health Precautions

Vaccination against hepatitis A is recommended for travellers to Spain. Vaccination against hepatitis B should be considered by frequent travellers or those intending on a long stay.

Please consult a medical practitioner or contact The Travel Doctor for your specific risk to these preventable diseases and the appropriate avoidance measures. Australians travelling to Spain should ensure that they have adequate travel insurance to cover the length of their stay. Medications that are legal in Australia may be illegal in other countries. Spain is Greenwich Mean Time +1 hour (+2 during daylight saving). The applicable time zone is Central European Time (CET) or Central European Summer Time (CEST). Daylight saving is observed from the last Sunday in March to the last Sunday in October.

Spain, 12 noon, Winter (Dec) = Perth 7pm, Darwin 8:30pm, Brisbane 9pm, Adelaide 9:30pm, Hobart, Melbourne, Sydney 10pm. Spain, 12 noon, Summer (Jun) = Perth 6pm, Darwin, Adelaide 7:30pm, Brisbane, Hobart, Melbourne, Sydney 8pm.

Page 3 of 5 General Destination Information for Spain Duty Free Allowances for Spain and Australia

Duty Free limits when entering Spain from a non EU state:Alcohol:1 L spirits (>22% alc vol) or 2 L other beverages;
as well as 4 L of still wine and 16 L of beer.

Tobacco: 200 cigarettes or 50 cigars or 250g of tobacco.

Other Goods: Up to a value of €430 for air and sea travellers, €300 for others and €150 for those under 15 years. Duty Free limits when entering Australia:

Alcohol:2.25 litres of alcoholic beverages.Tobacco:25 cigarettes plus one open packet of cigarettes.Other Goods:Up to \$900 (\$450 for minors).

Minors may not claim alcohol or tobacco products. Further restrictions apply when entering/exiting Spain, Europe and Australia. Travellers are encouraged to familiarise themselves with these restrictions before crossing the borders of either country. Electrical Adaptors and Voltage

Electrical Socket type: European (type C).

Supply: Usually 220-240 V, 50 Hz (same as Australia).

A voltage converter will not usually be required to use appliances designed for Australian use.

A socket converter is usually all that will be required for Australian appliances.

Interbank Rate 1 Australian Dollar (AUD) = 0.63 Euro 1 Euro (EUR) = 1.58 Australian Dollars

With 4% Margin 1 Australian Dollar (AUD) will buy 0.61 Euro 1 Euro (EUR) will cost 1.65 Australian Dollars

All rates were correct at a point in time on Monday, 05 Nov 2018. The "Interbank Rate" does not take into account any exchange fees, while the "With 4% Margin" adds 4% to the exchange rate to simulate a typical margin that would be paid when exchanging currencies. These rates have been rounded and should not be used when calculating transactions of large value.

Information and Cheat Sheet Purchasing-Power Parity

The following is a purchasing-power comparison of the Euro in Spain and the Australian Dollar, using the Big Mac as a common good. While it does not present a faultless comparison, it is a useful indicator of the purchasing-power of the two currencies.

Big Mac Australia: \$5.95 (AUD) = 3.76 Euro Big Mac Spain: €3.95 (EUR) = 6.26 Australian Dollars

A Big Mac in Spain is therefore 5% more expensive than in Australia.

This comparison is based on 2018 prices using current exchange rates. Prices may not include variations by locality or local taxes.
