Page 1 of 5 Important Information Prior to Travelling to Egypt

Passport and Tourist Visa Conditions

Australian ordinary passport holders are required to have a visa to enter Egypt. Most travellers are able to obtain a tourist visa when entering Egypt through major ports of entry for US\$25. Alternatively, travellers may apply for an eVisa online at www.visa2egypt.gov.eg up to seven days before departure for Egypt. When entering Egypt, travellers should have at least six months validity on their passports (with two blank facing pages), be able to show documentation confirming their ability to financially maintain themselves and have tickets and entry documents for their next destination. Additional conditions apply to minors. Travellers are recommended to contact a Egyptian mission on the details below for further information and to ensure their specific circumstances make them eligible to enter Egypt using an eVisa or to receive a visa upon arrival. Those who do not meet these conditions will need to apply for a visa from an Egyptian mission listed below.

Current DFAT Travel Advice

This advice is current for Thu, 1st November 2018.

Reconsider your need to travel to Egypt due to the threat of terrorist attack and kidnapping. See <u>Safety and security</u>. <u>Do not travel</u> to the Governorate of North Sinai, including along the Taba-Suez Road, due to the high threat of terrorist attack and risks posed by violent criminals. Terrorist attacks targeting Egyptian security forces occur frequently. <u>Do not travel</u> within 50 kilometres of the border with Libya. A number of deadly attacks have recently occurred in the area.

Tourists, tourist infrastructure and religious sites in South Sinai are attractive targets for terrorist groups. Avoid unnecessary road travel outside of resort areas in Sharm el Sheikh. Terrorists claimed responsibility for the explosion of Metrojet flight 9268, which departed from Sharm el Sheikh in October 2015. See Safety and security. Terror attacks could occur at anytime, anywhere in Egypt. Potential targets include religious sites and communities, government buildings, security checkpoints and locations frequented by tourists. Be alert to possible threats in these locations and follow the instructions of local authorities. See Safety and security

Egypt closed its borders to all Qatari flights on 6 June 2017 until further notice. If you're travelling between Egypt and Qatar, contact your air travel provider for further information.

While homosexuality isn't illegal in Egypt, homosexuality is not socially tolerated. Members of the LGBTI community can be prosecuted under debauchery laws. Since September 2017, a number of people have been arrested under debauchery laws. There are reports of people being entrapped via dating apps and through social media. See <u>Laws</u>

Vaccination against Hepatitis A is recommended for travellers to Egypt. Vaccination against Hepatitis B and Rabies (particularly if working with animals) should be considered by frequent or long stay travellers. Vaccination against Typhoid should be considered particularly when travelling to areas with poor sanitation and hygiene. Care with food and beverage selection is recommended. There is a low risk of Malaria in Egypt and Dengue Fever also occurs, as such insect avoidance measures and anti malarial medication may be necessary depending on your itinerary.

Regardless of destination, all travellers should be up-to-date with their routine "background" vaccinations including for influenza. Please consult a medical practitioner or contact The Travel Doctor for your specific risk to these preventable diseases and the appropriate avoidance measures. Australians travelling to Egypt should ensure that they have adequate travel insurance to cover the length of their stay. Medications that are legal in Australia may be illegal in other countries. 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Duty Free Allowances for Egypt and Australia

Duty Free allowances when entering Egypt: Alcohol: 1 L of alcoholic beverages.

Tobacco: 200 cigarettes or 200g of tobacco or 25 cigars.

Perfume: Reasonable amounts for personal use.

Other Goods: Up to 1500 Egyptian Pounds.

Duty Free allowances when entering Australia:

Alcohol: 2.25 litres.

Tobacco: 25 cigarettes plus one open packet of cigarettes. Other Goods:Up to a value of \$900 (\$450 if under 18 years).

Minors may not claim alcohol or tobacco products. Further restrictions apply when entering and exiting Egypt and Australia. Travellers are encouraged to familiarise themselves with these restrictions before entering either country. 
Egyptian Public Holidays 2018



Islamic holidays are determined by sightings of the moon and thus may vary. Those dates marked with a * are holidays only for Coptic Christians (approximately 10% of the population). Most businesses and shops are closed on Fridays (the day of rest), while many also close on Saturdays.

All rates were correct at a point in time on Monday, 05 Nov 2018. The "Interbank Rate" does not take into account any exchange fees, while the "With 4% Margin" adds 4% to the exchange rate to simulate a typical margin that would be paid when exchanging currencies. These rates have been rounded and should not be used when calculating transactions of large value.

Information and Cheat Sheet

Purchasing Power Parity

The following is a purchasing power comparison of the Egyptian Pound and the Australian Dollar, using the Big Mac as a common good. While it does not present a faultless comparison, it is a useful indicator of the purchasing power of the two currencies.

Big Mac Australia: \$5.95 (AUD) = 76 Egyptian Pounds
Big Mac Egypt: 34.21 (EGP) = 2.69 Australian Dollars

A Big Mac in Egypt is therefore 55% less expensive than in Australia.

This comparison is based on 2018 prices using current exchange rates. Prices may not include variations by locality or local taxes.

Notes and Coins

The legal currency of Egypt is the Egyptian Pound, which is abbreviated using the symbol "LE" (eg LE 100), the currency code "EGP" or less frequently "E£". The subunit of the pound is called the Piastre or Qirsh, of which there are 100 in every pound. The following units of currency are the most common but other versions and denominations are also in circulation. Pictures are not to scale. As it is illegal in many countries to print copies of bank notes, travellers are advised to remove the below images when travelling.
