of 5 Important Information Prior to Page 1 Travelling t o French Polynesia Passport and Tourist Visa Conditions

Australian ordinary passport holders usually do not require a visa to enter French Polynesia as a tourist for a period of up to 90 days in any six month period. It is recommended that passports be valid for six months beyond the period of intended stay. Travellers should also be able to show documentation confirming their ability to financially maintain themselves, their travel insurance and tickets and entry documents for their next destination.

For further information and to confirm that you are eligible to travel to French Polynesia without a visa, please contact a French mission on the details provided below.

Current DFAT Travel Advice

This advice is current for Thu, 1st November 2018.

Exercise normal safety precautions in French Polynesia. Use common sense. Look out for suspicious behaviour, as you would in Australia. Mosquito-borne diseases, including dengue fever and Zika virus, are risks. Protect yourself against mosquito bites. Outbreaks of leptospirosis, scabies and diarrhoea also occur. See Health. Medical costs in French Polynesia are high. Make sure you have adequate travel insurance, including for any pre-existing conditions. See Health.

Industrial disputes and strikes can cause disruption to essential services and transport, including international and domestic flights. Monitor developments and plan accordingly. Avoid demonstrations and large public gatherings, as they could turn violent. See Safety and security. Cyclone season is normally from November to April but you could encounter tropical storms or cyclones at any time of year. See Natural disasters. Fa'a'? International Airport in Papeete is sometimes closed during periods of heavy rain. See Natural disasters.

Vaccination against Hepatitis A is recommended for travellers to French Polynesia. Vaccination against Hepatitis B should be considered by frequent or long stay travellers. Vaccination against Typhoid should be considered particularly when travelling to areas with poor sanitation and hygiene. As Dengue Fever occurs in French Polynesia, insect avoidance measures may be required.

Regardless of destination, all travellers should be up-to-date with their routine "background" vaccinations, including for Tetanus and Diphtheria (with a booster within the last 10 years), Whooping Cough, Polio (with a booster in adult life), Measles, Mumps and Rubella (two combination vaccinations through life), Chicken Pox and a recent annual Influenza vaccination.

Please consult a medical practitioner or contact The Travel Doctor for your specific risk to these preventable diseases and the appropriate avoidance measures. Australians travelling to French Polynesia should ensure that they have adequate travel insurance to cover the length of their stay. Medications that are legal in Australia may be illegal in other countries. 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Page 2 of 5 Important Information while Travelling in French Polynesia Time Differences between French Polynesia and Australia

Most of French Polynesia is Greenwich Mean Time -10 hours, while the Marquesas (GMT-9.5) and Gambier Islands (GMT-9) are in different times zones. The applicable time zone in most of French Polynesia is called Tahiti Time (THAT). Daylight saving time is not observed. The following times in Australia are a day ahead of the time in the French Polynesia, for instance, if it's Sunday in French Polynesia, it's Monday in Australia.

Tahiti Time, 12 noon, Winter (Jun) = Perth 6am; Adelaide, Darwin 7:30am; Brisbane, Hobart, Melbourne, Sydney 8am. Tahiti Time, 12 noon, Summer (Dec) = Perth 6am; Darwin 7:30am; Brisbane 8am; Adelaide 8:30am; Hobart, Melbourne, Sydney 9am.



Banknotes of French Polynesia

The currency of French Polynesia is the French Pacific Franc, which is abbreviated using the term "CFP Franc" or the currency code "XPF". The French Pacific Franc is also used in New Caledonia and Wallis and Futuna. The following units of currency are the most common however other units are also in circulation (including a new set of banknotes slowly being introduced). As it is illegal in many countries to print copies of bank notes, travellers are advised to remove the below images before travelling.



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


